Capt Elaine Chiang was raised in Coquitlam, British Columbia. She completed the International Baccalaureate Program at Port Moody Secondary School and proceeded to attend Simon Fraser University for her Systems Engineering undergraduate degree. She is currently employed as a Software Developer at Workday for mobile technologies.

The cadet program has been a significant part of Capt Chiang's upbringing. She joined the cadet program in 759 Falcon Squadron in Burnaby at 12 years old and graduated from the program as a Warrant Officer Second Class with lifelong friendships and experiences.

Upon graduating from the program, she joined the Cadet Instructor Cadre as a member of the Canadian Forces Reserve in 2010. From 2010-2016, Capt Chiang served as Band Officer and Training Officer at 754 Phoenix Squadron leading the squadron's 65 piece provincial award-winning band. In 2016, Capt Chiang helped spearhead and charter a new cadet squadron in the Lower Mainland which is now officially known as 808 Coquitlam Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron. In September 2019, Captain Chiang was appointed the second Commanding Officer of 808 Coquitlam Squadron. She is currently the Commanding Officer of 848 Royal Roads Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron in Colwood.

Since 2010, Captain Chiang has completed many years of service at Albert Head Cadet Training Centre working with the Music program, and has been employed as a Staff Officer at the Regional Cadet Support Unit (Pacific). She has been active in the development and delivery of Year 5 Workshops to senior cadets all over British Columbia, and has also provided musical instruction to cadets in communities across BC for the past decade. Capt Chiang currently resides in Victoria, British Columbia with her husband, son, and dog.

Carol Lee was born and raised in Surrey, BC. Her post secondary education involved science studies at Kwantlen College, Surrey, followed by graduation from the Dental Hygiene Diploma Program at the University of Alberta in 1987. Carol has worked as a Dental Hygienist in General Practice Dentistry ever since.

Carol's journey with the Air Cadet Program started in 2005 when her oldest son, at 12 years old, joined 754 Phoenix Squadron in Port Moody. Wanting to support her son and the squadron, Carol volunteered in small ways whenever she could. As her two younger children eventually joined air cadets, Carol became more involved with 754 Phoenix Squadron Sponsoring Committee (SSC), serving on the board of directors for eight years from 2011 to 2019. During her time on the board, she served as secretary for two years and chairperson for four years.

As well, Carol was involved in the joint effort between 754 Phoenix RCACS and SSC in the formation of 808 Coquitlam Squadron (chartered in 2016), the newest air cadet squadron in the growing Tri-Cities region. She received a Certificate of Merit from the Air Cadet League of Canada, British Columbia Provincial Committee (ACLC, BCPC) in acknowledgement of her contributions to this endeavour.

In April 2020, Carol's youngest child aged out of the air cadet program. Witnessing the value of the Cadet Program to her three children and youth across Canada, and desiring to continue her support of the Air Cadet Program in BC, Carol joined the ACLC, BCPC in May 2020. Carol currently serves on the BCPC Training and Education Committee and supports 754 Phoenix SSC and 808 Coquitlam SSC as a league representative.

Captain Trevor Tsang



Captain Trevor Tsang has been involved in the cadet program since 2008. He was a cadet with 111 Pegasus Squadron in Vancouver, completing the program at the rank of Warrant Officer First Class.

After completing cadets, Capt Tsang enrolled as an officer in the Cadet Instructor Cadre branch of the Canadian Armed Forces in 2014. He worked at 637 Arrow Squadron in Burnaby as a member of their training team, Standards Officer, Supply Officer, and Drill Team Officer. During his time at 759 Falcon Squadron in Burnaby, he was Administration Officer and Drill Team Officer. There, he led the drill team to be zone champions. He arrived at 808 Coquitlam Squadron in 2017 and served as Training Officer and Deputy Commanding Officer. By 2018 and upon his promotion to his present rank, Capt Tsang had worked in every department of an Air Cadet Squadron and was well-positioned to assume command in 2022 when he was appointed the fourth Commanding Officer of 808 Coquitlam Squadron.

Since 2012, Capt Tsang has served at Penhold Cadet Training Centre in Red Deer, AB, Albert Head Cadet Training Centre in Victoria, BC, His Majesty's Canadian Ship Quadra Cadet Training Centre in Comox, BC, and locally as the officer-in-charge of the Lower Mainland Cadet Activity Program. Throughout his career, he has been recognized for his exceptional leadership and initiative with several Commanding Officer's Coins and Certificates of Appreciation.

Capt Tsang has a Bachelor of Science, Bachelor of Education, and Masters of Education from the University of British Columbia. Outside of cadets, he is a special education teacher in the Richmond School District



SQUADRON BACKGROUND

808 Coquitlam Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron chartered on March 8, 2016. Prior to 808's formation, the cadet group was a part of 754 Phoenix Royal Canadian Air Cadet Squadron located in Port Moody. The squadron originally began with a modest 20 cadet core and has since grown to over 100 cadets. What originally started as a pilot project quickly expanded to becoming one of British Columbia's brightest up and coming squadrons.



The Air Cadet Program is only possible through the national partnership between the Department of National Defense and the Air Cadet League of Canada. The League provides funds for activities and aviation opportunities, which are essential elements to an exciting cadet experience. It is at the local level that Cadet Instructors Cadre Officers and Squadron Sponsoring Committee collaborate to make this dynamic youth program a reality.

AIR CADET LEAGUE OF CANADA

PROVINCIAL COMMITTEE HISTORY

The Air Cadet program operates within a partnership agreement between the Department of National Defense (DND) and The Air Cadet League of Canada (ACLC), a civilian volunteer organization. The British Columbia Provincial Committee (BCPC) of the ACLC is administered by a 10-member Board of Directors. The Directors are elected by the members of BCPC at the Annual General Meeting. BCPC's office is located at Boundary Bay Airport, Delta, and its day-to-day operations are administered by a full time Executive Director, and a part time Office Administration Clerk.

There are currently 57 Squadrons in BC, geographically grouped into 3 zones supported by Group Chairs. Each zone is then subdivided into Wings which are also supported by Wing Chairs.





AIR CADET LEAGUE OF CANADA

PROVINCIAL COMMITTEE HISTORY (CONTINUED)

The main areas of responsibility for the British Columbia Provincial Committee include:

- The formation of new squadrons
- Providing training and support for Squadron Sponsoring Committees assisting with the recruitment of officers and cadets into the program publicizing and promoting cadet activities and programs.
- Maintaining our fleet of 6 tow planes and twelve gliders. For the past several years, our glider flying program has received generous financial assistance from the British Columbia Gaming Commission by way of its "Direct Access Grant Program".
- Administering the Effective Speaking Program in BC, (also funded through the Direct Access Grant program).
- Processing applications for National Scholarship Courses
- Sponsoring Work Experience programs with industry partners to provide opportunities for Cadets to earn Graduation Transition Credits
- Administering the Air Cadet Foundation of British Columbia, a charitable society established to maintain and grow the Air Cadet Program in British Columbia.



COOPERATIVE ROLE BETWEEN THE MILITARY AND CIVILIAN LEAGUE



The Air Cadet League of Canada (ACLC) and the Department of National Defense (DND) both support the Royal Canadian Air Cadets, a premier and beneficial youth organization. The Air Cadet program is a comprehensive program, which is run in a very organized, disciplined, and safe manner. Saying that, it is important to ensure that all volunteers are appropriately selected, well-intended, initially supervised, offer skills that add value and complement the program, and are good role models for Air Cadets. Knowing the skills and talents of each and every volunteer and their intention towards the program is very important to the Squadron Officers, staff and Sponsoring Committee, as a good team effort produces the best results for the greater benefit of the Air Cadet Movement, or more generally, the cadet movement as a whole.



COOPERATIVE ROLE BETWEEN THE MILITARY AND CIVILIAN LEAGUE

CONTINUED

The Air Cadet League's responsibilities for Civilian Instructors (CI) and Volunteers complement those of the DND and are more of a supporting nature. The Commanding Officer of the squadron and his or her supporting staff have command and control of the Cadets and are responsible for overall supervision of the training program that is conducted. To fulfill its responsibilities to the cadets, DND is required to conform to rulings by the Supreme Court of Canada that defined the level of care required by an organization in protecting youth under its direction. In fact, the level of care has been defined in a way that would be similar to a parent protecting their child. Saying that, it is also reasonable that our registration and screening protocols for Civilian Instructors and Volunteers meet the same standard of that of the Canadian Forces, both Regular and Reserve, as well as contracted Civilian Instructors.





CADET INSTRUCTORS CADRE : A HISTORY

The Canadian Forces Reserve Cadet Instructor Cadre celebrated 100 years of service to Canada in 2009. There are about 7,500 officers that represent the Canadian Forces from coast to coast to coast in large cities and hamlets in all regions of the country. The Cadet Organizations, Royal Canadian Sea, Army and Air Cadets are part of the Nation's fabric because of the dedication and service of thousands of adults who lead and mentor the teenagers of their community.



The first cadet instructors were assigned in 1879 by the Department of Militia to support Associations or Companies for Drill in High Schools, Normal Schools, Colleges and Universities. Authority for Cadet Instructors to hold rank in the Militia was promulgated 1903 appointing individuals for only as long as they remained active. Subsequently, on May 1, 1909, the "Corps of School Cadet Instructors (Militia) was authorized. The Corps was composed of qualified male schoolteachers. On January 1, 1924, the designation was changed to "The Cadet Services of Canada."



CADET INSTRUCTOR CADRE : A HISTORY

CONTINUED

Prior to 1940, the first Air Cadet Squadrons were in fact Army Cadet Corps that were affiliated with Royal Canadian Air Force, Air Reserve Squadrons whose officers provided leadership with League appointed Civilian Instructors. On November 11, 1940, an Order-in-Council established the Air Cadet League of Canada to work in partnership with the RCAF to support the Air Cadet Organization. The Cadet Instructor Cadre Branch is the result of the unification of the Canadian Forces in 1968 and the subsequent consolidation of cadet instructors to the Cadet Instructors List. The Cadet Instructors List was renamed the Cadet Instructor Cadre July 21, 1994.



The Cadet Instructor Cadre is provided by the largest officer occupation in the CF. Canadian Forces Officers whose mission is “To instil in youth the attributes of good citizenship, and leadership, promote physical fitness and stimulate an interest in the sea, land, and air activities of the Canadian Forces.



CADET INSTRUCTOR CADRE : PRESENT DAY

The Cadet Instructor Cadre (CIC) consists of specially trained part-time members of the Canadian Armed Forces Reserves. CIC Officers are responsible for cadet training, supervision, and administration, and as such are important figures in the life of a cadet. They are driven by a strong desire to see cadets grow into responsible adults by providing credible role models for youth looking for a sense of direction and belonging. Many CIC Officers were once cadets themselves although this is not a prerequisite. The CIC is one of the most diversified and active components of the Canadian Forces Reserves, drawing on the vast and varied experience of personnel in local communities who wish to contribute to the Cadet programme.
